

Quilted Comfort

This year we are making 9 patch blocks. Please make one or more of any or all blocks. Finished blocks will be 12½". For each block, you will need:

- #4 4 1/2" solid (or small prints that 'read' as the color), and
- #5 4 ½" white or tones of white blocks

A different color will be requested each month...with turn-in at the following month's meeting.

September Any color Turn-in October. Dark blue solids/small print November November. Dark green solid/small print January Brown solid/small print January. **February** Red/white/blue/patriotic March February. March. Dark purple solid/small print April Quilter's choice /solids/small print April. May May. Yellow/gold/mustard/small print June

Dear Fellow Quilters!

I've heard it said by many guild members, "How can we get the next generation interested in sewing & quilting?" My daughter, Kathleen, Founder and Principal of Jefferson RISE (Public) Charter School in Gretna Louisiana, has a teacher in her school that is trying to do exactly that! Jefferson RISE services a working class community that, like New Orleans only 15 minutes away, was ravaged by Hurricane Katrina. At the beginning of this school year Kathleen asked for proposals to bring 'the arts' into the school, and Ms. Blunt proposed a Sewing & Design Program.

Along with a small amount of \$\$ from the school budget, Ms. Blunt (see link below), was able to fund a more robust program through donations via the non-profit organization, www.DonorsChoose.org. Donors Choose 'vetts' all teacher-applicants and their proposals and, once approved, puts their proposals onto the Donors Choose website, where donors (like you and me!) can choose which projects to support. Once a project is FULLY FUNDED through donations, supplies listed in the proposal are purchased 'wholesale' by Donors Choose thereby making donations through Donors Choose go a VERY long way!

- There are 80-90 supporting guilds and 900 individual members of the NEQM, with only 20% of guild members also being individual members. Only 6% of the museum's funding comes from guilds. 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Curatorial Corner | New Exhibition Coming Soon Early New England Quilts: Repurposed, Refashioned, and Reused

Opening June 1, the Village's newest exhibition - Early New England Quilts: Repurposed, Refashioned, and Reused - will highlight and explore some of the creative ways women reused, repurposed, and refashioned materials into quilts. Advice book author Lydia Maria Child dedicated her American Frugal Housewife, to "those not ashamed of economy." Women in the early 19th century applied this adage to a ubiquitous textile found in many New England households, quilts.

Early New England quilt makers salvaged materials for a new sewn creation by incorporating recycled material from old garments and household textiles into "scrap" quilts. Some took perfectly serviceable older garments and gave them new life by refashioning them into bed guilts. Sarah Snell Bryant noted in February 1830 that she "began to piece up some old callicoes [sic] for bed quilting," likely referring to old calico dresses. Sentimentality governed reuse on occasion as old garments belonging to a beloved family member could be included as a remembrance. Commemorative textiles, specifically those dedicated to patriotic sentiment, were integrated into quilts. One example from the Arnold family of Rhode Island includes a Declaration of Independence handkerchief. In many instances, a quilt was recycled after it outlived its primary function,

and quilts appear as backings for hearth rugs, cut into strips for hassock (footstool) cushions, or even cut down to fit a smaller bed.

New Englanders let nothing go to waste as they applied the principle of Yankee frugality to their quilt production. Be sure to visit the Village after June 1 to see these inventive quilt creations!

Floral Hand Applique

This workshop demonstrates my layered, hand-appliqué technique with simple applique shapes using freezer paper templates and liquid starch. The class will also cover how I build my pictorial wall quilts and how to get beautiful details by letting the fabric choices do all the hard work.

\$10 pattern fee.

Students should bring a variety of pre-washed fabrics with printed textures and blending patterns to create a flower in the color of their choosing!



STUDENT SUPPLIES NEEDED:

- · Paper scissors and fabric scissors
- Hand-sewing needle: I use Bohin, Long #9 Appliqué
- · Iron and ironing surface
- Hand-sewing thread:
 I use Masterpiece cotton (50/2)
- Appliqué pins: I use Bohin
- · Pencil or mechanical pencil
- Resealable plastic bag to hold cut-out appliqué shapes
- Trolley needle (finger stiletto optional, but very useful)

RHYTHM and HUES FREE-MOTION MACHINE QUILTING



Find your rhythm in this free-motion machine quilting mini-workshop with David Taylor. Each lesson helps build confidence in stitch regulation and tension adjustment. We'll be using a variety of thread types – cotton, polyester, glitter and metallic – on cotton fabric and batting sandwiches. All materials are supplied for this workshop and included in your kit fee. Kit fee: \$50 per student.

STUDENT SUPPLIES NEEDED:

- Sewing machine with freemotion stitching capability (required). Please bring the instruction manual for your machine!
- Extension table for your machine. *Most manufacturers*
- include this as an accessory or bring your Sew Steady table, or similar)
- Size 90/14 sewing machine needle preferred
- Free-motion foot or darning foot for your machine
- · Foot pedal for your machine
- A bobbin for your machine wound with white polyester thread
- An empty bobbin for your machine
- Thread snips or small scissors

This class is best-suited for today's domestic sewing machines and/or sit-down quilting machines. Older domestic machine models, basic straight stitch models and/or portable sewing machines are not well-suited for this class.
